

Thank you for visiting. We hope that you enjoy your walk. This walking track network and interpretation has cost in excess of \$150,000. There is no charge to walk the tracks and it is our pleasure to share this beautiful area with you. However, if you would like to make a donation, that would be appreciated and will help us to extend and maintain the facilities.

To maximise your safety and enjoyment, please read this important information:

- You will encounter various hazards along the tracks. Please read this information and only proceed if you choose to meet the challenges ahead.
- Our walks meet Australian Standard for a Class 3 or 4 walking tracks.
- The Looking After Country loop and the Rainforest track meet the upper end of Class 3 and are suitable for people of average fitness wearing closed toe street shoes.
- Waterfall Track is Class 4 and has some mud and trip hazards.
- The track to Mt Misery is suitable for people with boots and moderate fitness. A few sections of the track to Mt Misery are substantial hazard areas. Risks are generally not managed. You might encounter steep slopes, cliffs, trip hazards, sharp objects, fallen logs, hazardous plants and animals. You might also encounter severe weather conditions, navigational challenges, and a range of other hazards. It is this level of adventure that sometimes makes such areas inviting to people. Unless you seek such adventure and have the necessary skills to meet these challenges, please do not leave the Tall Trees Track loop.
- Regnans Lookout, near the escarpment on The Dreaming Track to Mt Misery, has non-protected cliff edges. Do not pass the gate unless you wish to be exposed to the hazards presented there.
- Trees and limbs can fall at any time, even in calm weather. Do not enter any forest in times of high winds.
- Representation on this map does not imply a right of public access. Some of the track is on public land, for which we pay an annual license fee plus a per walker fee to Forestry Tasmania. The track ends at the Rock Outcrop. The last 20 meters to the actual summit is private and the absent owner has withdrawn community walking access.
- This map is provided free of charge and forms no contract with Huon Bush Retreats, Huon Nature Trust or any person connected with HBR or HNT.
- This map is provided as a guide only. 1:25,000 topographic maps are recommended for navigation.
- You should not undertake any walks unless you have the navigational skills, physical fitness, suitable footwear and clothing and adequate ability and equipment to deal with any emergency situations that may arise.

Labyrinth:

Class 3 & 4 Walking Tracks

Our walking tracks comply with Australian Standard AS2156. All tracks at least meet Class 4 and most sections meet Class 3. (Strong, closed toe shoes, are recommended)

Overview Visitors to walk in slightly modified natural environments requiring a moderate level of fitness. Users can expect opportunities to observe and appreciate the natural environment with limited provision of interpretive signage. Users can expect occasional encounters with others.

Track condition Generally a modified surface, sections may be hardened. Width: variable and generally less than 1200 mm. Kept mostly clear of intrusions and obstacles.

Gradient May exceed 1:10 for short sections but generally no steeper than 1:10. Steps may be common.

Signage Signs and track markers may be used for direction. Limited signage for management and interpretation purposes.

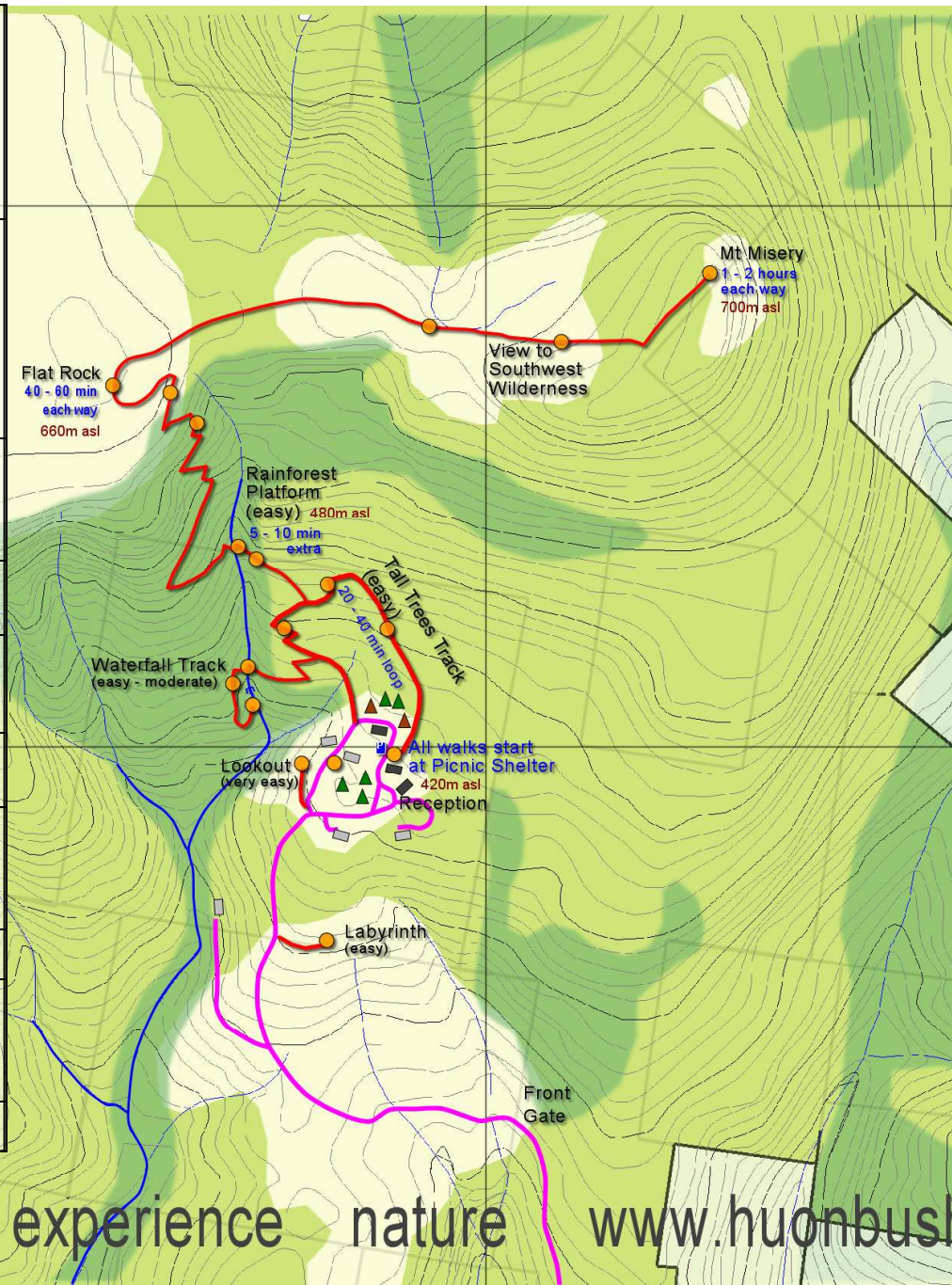
Infra-structure Facilities generally not provided except for specific safety and environmental considerations.

Terrain Users need no bushwalking experience and a minimum level of specialized skills. Users may encounter natural hazards such as steep slopes, unstable surfaces and minor water crossings.

Weather Storms may affect navigation and safety.

Risk management Built elements will be inspected and maintained regularly. Any built facilities will be managed for public risk. Inspection interval: 6 months or less.

Safety Users are responsible for their own safety.
